Business Studies Trip

On 8th November, our business class went on a trip to the Jaguar Land Rover Engine Manufacturing Centre in order to learn how a big corporate business operates and solves the problems they face. We started the day with an introduction to the company and saw the types of cars they are designing for the future. It was surprising how far ahead they were planning and showed us that the business is always looking for and taking, the next step. After this, we proceeded to have a tour of the centre, looking at all the machinery that they have invested in and just how precise they have to be in creating the 120 types of engine they make. Whilst on this tour, we learned just how much Jaguar Land Rover thinks about the environment, even designing their building to have the least amount of impact on the surrounding area, people and animals. The last activity we did was a team competition in which we were given a picture of a plastic model of an engine, which we had remake as accurately as possible. The challenge was harder than expected and required a keen eye for detail and good problem solving skills. Overall, the trip taught us the skills that are required to work at Jaguar Land Rover, a company that looks ahead and puts customers first.

Smethwick Students Step Inside the World of Housing

Local students were given an insight into the workings of a live housing development by home builder Countryside, with a visit to its current Galton Lock development, in Smethwick.

Countryside welcomed the group of 16 pupils from Shireland Collegiate Academy for a tour of its Mafeking Road development, with a closer look at the homes currently being built. The visit was organised to support the students' 'Grand Designs' project, which focuses on designs from around the world, by proving the opportunity to experience the homebuilding progress - from the construction of the timber frame to dressing the showhomes.

During the visit, the students also heard from Countryside's Health and Safety Manager, Jonathan Haw, who spoke to them about how Countryside builds its homes and the materials used throughout the process, plus the safety aspects of working on, and living near, a live construction site. Joanne Bradbury, Sales and Marketing Director for Partnerships Midlands at Countryside, commented: "The visit from Shireland Collegiate Academy was a brilliant opportunity for the students to experience first hand the stages involved in building homes, as well as the in-depth safety procedures that Countryside follows. We hope the students were able to take away a greater understanding of how homes are designed and that it's inspired some of them to become the next generation of housebuilders or designers." In October, an ex-Shireland student Manjot Singh came in to do a talk about applying for Medicine. Manjot is a 5th year Medical student at the University of Birmingham who completed his GCSEs and A-Levels at Shireland. Manjot also talked about his experience of applying to Medical school at Oxford University and the 2-day interview process. Over 30 A-Level Chemistry students attended the session and it actually ran over due to the number of questions that students were asking.

Rehman Alam, an ex-Shireland student also came into the Academy on Wednesday 5th December to do a talk on Studying Optometry at Aston University and School life at Shireland during his GCSEs and A-Levels. He talked about his experience of completing his A-Level studies which he said "was the hardest two years of his life". He gave some excellent advice on revising for A-Levels and how to apply for Optometry. Students also asked lots of questions about University life and how he was finding the course. The talk lasted over an hour and was attended by over 25 A-Level Chemistry students.

Year 7 November - December half term

A series of interactive workshops enabled them to learn about the history and origins of pantomime, how audiences participate during a pantomime and what pantomimes are performed today. This fast-paced day ended with students working in groups to script and perform their own version of the ever-popular Cinderella – with many memorable and hilarious results!
