#### Dear families,

This has been an incredibly challenging term for all of our community. We have had to deal with some of the largest disruptions to the way school is run in all of my 20 plus years of teaching. However, I am very proud of the approach that students, families and staff have taken to address these issues. We have had very little cross infection in the school community despite some of the highest infection rates in the country in the areas that we serve.



We have continued to provide high quality education despite having staff delivering remotely into school and also delivering remotely to students who have had to isolate or whom we have had to have working remotely due to capacity issues. The quality of the remote education provided continues to be of the highest quality. I have been pleased to see that the majority of students have engaged with this remote education when they have been absent from the Academy.

Usually our newsletter is packed with extracurricular activities that the students have taken part in with descriptions of successes and challenges they have overcome and exciting experiences and I am hugely disappointed that this has been somewhat curtailed by the restrictions in place. 
#### MyON



#### Year 9 Options Taster Day

On Wednesday 4th November, our Year 9 students embarked on their first step towards the Options Process. They were given the opportunity to test what it would be like to study both old and new subjects from a GCSE perspective.

In Travel and Tourism, students participated in a virtual field trip where they visited key tourist attractions in England such as, Stonehenge, Buckingham Palace, the Lake District and the Roman Baths. Students got the opportunity to explore these key attractions from a tourist's perspective. Students then took part in a Visit England activity discovering the main appeal of England as a tourist destination.

In Art, the students were influenced by Ben Wilson to create "chewing gum paintings" using Blue Tac instead of chewing gum.



In Drama the students created their own 'Camp Fire Stories' and performed these, complete with their own choice of stage lighting, in the Theatre. They were brilliant at adapting to the new way of working within practical lessons, following all the rules so that we could work safely. The performances from all students were engaging and creative, and clearly demonstrated the high level of acting talent we have within our Year 9 students at Shireland. Congratulations to all students who were involved in the Drama taster sessions.

Year 9s who chose PE as one of their Tasters spent the time testing their fitness in the Sports Hall to see how they compared to the average 14 year old. Students worked their way around a series of fitness tests to gauge aspects of their fitness such as agility, co-ordination, flexibility and reaction time. Based on these tests they were able to identify their strengths and weaknesses with the goal of improving their sport.

#### **Futures Programme**

Year 13s attended the annual personal statement conference at the start of term – albeit virtually! Thank you to all who contributed, including representatives from Highways England, Turn Town, Coventry University, Birmingham City University, Aston University, University of Birmingham and Hill Top Pharmacy.

As a result of this fantastic opportunity, we have seen applications to university remain buoyant during these uncertain times, with destinations including University of Oxford, Russell Group Universities (Birmingham, Warwick, UCL, King's College London and Bristol) as well as our local universities. The range of subjects that students are applying to read include medicine, computer science, midwifery, psychology and modern languages. In order to further support our students with the next step of their application each student is receiving a tailor-made mock interview late this term. We wish all our students the very best with their applications.

Meanwhile, our Year 12s are just embarking on their Futures Programme and this term's theme is exploring options. Whilst external visitors are not able to visit the Academy at this time we have not let this stop us from helping students explore their option post Sixth Form. A wide range of virtual talks have been available for our students covering topics such as Gap Year opportunities, the benefits of university, apprenticeship opportunities and employment key skills. A big thank you to representatives from De Montford University, Sheffield University, Avtar Marway, University of Gloucestershire and NCU for giving their time to support our students.





#### Transferable skill programme

The transferable skills programme offers our students the opportunity to develop their skills at Sixth Form to prepare them for study now and at university, as well as the world of work.

#### Year 9 Options Taster Day



# Drama

#### **Acting for Camera Workshops**

Our Sixth form Drama students have been taking part in Acting for Camera Workshops, exploring the technical skills required of both the actor and the film crew. Both Year 12 and 13 students are working within the genre of murder mystery for their final pieces. Year 12 are recreating scenes from Agatha Christie's 'And Then There Were None', an exciting locked room murder mystery, and Year 13 are filming their own script, written by Rushda Khan (13FBY), based on a group of trainee detectives who have been set a cold case to try to solve as part of their training. All of our sixth form Drama students have engaged exceptionally well with the projects and we look forward to seeing the final films when they are released after Christmas!



#### Virtual Backstage Tour of Birmingham Hippodrome

As we were unable to run our usual backstage tour trip this term, Birmingham Hippodrome have provided us with access to a virtual tour instead! Our Year 10 Drama students were guided around Birmingham Hippodrome by one of the technical directors, gaining access to areas such as the main stage, the fly floor, the prompt desk, the technical box, and the wings. The virtual tour gave students information about the history of Birmingham Hippodrome, some insight into the different job roles involved in a big show and an explanation of the equipment used. The virtual tour was really informative and thoroughly enjoyable.

#### **Careers in the Creative Industry Workshops**

Our Sixth Form Drama students have been studying careers within the Creative Arts Industry. They have been able to work with Ben Hallworth, Learning Officer from Hippodrome Education Network, to explore different careers and pathways to those careers. They have had access to Digital Masterclass resources, created by Birmingham Hippodrome, in which a number of industry professionals, including a Choreographer, Lead Technician, Visual Artist, and an Artistic Director, outline their day-to-day lives within the job role and give advice to students who wish to work in that field. It has been a very useful and interesting experience for the students.

We are always very proud of our GCSE and A-Level German classes, but this year has been such a challenging year for everybody and we are so proud of the way they have all participated in the lessons with the usual enthusiasm and gusto! ### Focus Days





#### Careers

Careers-minded Year Seven students spent a lively and creative Focus Day thinking about their future occupations. As part of the Year Seven L4L Personal Development curriculum, Careers Guidelines and Education is becoming an increasingly important aspect of the Year Seven experience. The Focus Day started by enabling students to use online tools to explore a range of potential careers and to write a CV.

The afternoon gave the children the opportunity to work in groups to showcase their ingenuity and entrepreneurial skills by creating, developing and presenting a product, service or app that would help people in society. We saw some very thoughtful ideas, such as a sign language translation phone app and a service to ensure that students don't forget to do their homework. Year Seven students enjoyed the day, which ended with them creating targets to help them to reach their career goals.

# Focus Days

#### **Grand Designs**

As part of their Grand Designs theme, Year Eight students spent their Focus Days researching some of the most amazing architectural buildings in the world today, including the Taj Mahal. Students used their artistic skills to recreate some of these buildings and demonstrate an understanding of architectural form. Furthermore, the theme of Grand Designs was extended to building students' knowledge of personal finance – a skill that our students have said is really important to them. Students spent time learning about mortgages and why budgeting is so important when you are a home-owner.

#### **Options Taster Day**

The Options Focus Day was a chance for us to familiarise ourselves with, and understand, the subjects that we could choose to take for the next two years. It was a great opportunity to see what those subjects had in store for us and whether they were exam based, involved a lot of practical skills and how much coursework was involved. It was really useful, especially with subjects that we had never taken before like Computer Science, Triple Science and Health and Social Care. This day essentially allowed us to see what the next two years of our lives would be like and to ensure that we enjoyed what we were doing. Overall, it was an exciting day that allowed many students to make their minds up about their future courses, which is not an easy decision. It was an enjoyable day that we all looked forward to and it helped to make the options process easier.

#### Maths

Year 11 Band A spent the day focusing on 'mathematical movement'. They built on work they had learnt earlier in Years Nine and Ten and focussed on enlarging shapes using fractional and negative scale factors. They day consisted of them drawing and visualising where objects would move, requiring them to be accurate and precise with their drawings. Some classes worked on vectors and started with visual diagrams and have built up their understanding to be able to calculate with vectors without using diagrams.
